Farewell Year 6



Congratulations!



Primary College 2023

Year 6 attended Cheshire College South and West and joined hundreds of children from across Crewe and Nantwich for the 29th Primary College events. They had an enjoyable day learning lots of new skills and having a go at new subjects. They enjoyed bricklaying, beauty, falconry, art and design, business, engineering and lots more, and represented the school very well.

Haircuts and Piercings

I would like to draw all parents' attention to our school uniform policy. While your child attends Weston, we expect them to conform to this. I specifically want to point out the following regarding piercings and hair styles:

Pupils are permitted to wear watches. For safety reasons, the children are only permitted to wear small stud earrings, which must be removed for PE lessons and after school sports clubs.

Pupils are not permitted unnatural hair colour (hair must be one colour) or extreme hairstyles, including designs or lines shaved into hair.

With regards to piercings, due to the healing time and curriculum requirement to participate in all PE lessons, the start of the summer holiday is the ideal time for piercings, if any, so as not to impact on your child's education. They must be able to remove and replace their own earrings. From a health and safety perspective, we will take a more firm stance on this next year.

With regards to hair styles, more and more children are coming to school with lines shaved into their hair. This is not acceptable and is typical school policy. Again, I suggest that this is a summer holiday hair cut. If your child comes to school with lines shaved into their hair from September, we will be contacting you to request that it is rectified. Please help your child to adhere to the policy and get in touch if, for any reason, they are struggling to do so.



Results 2023

As you know, primary school children are assessed against a number of metrics. As a school we prioritise the whole curriculum and personal development as the best foundation for building future success. Our Secrets of Success also promote qualities such as Improve and Work Hard and Don't Give Up, and we are really proud of the children's attitudes to school. When it comes to tests, we have an aspiration for

children to do their very best but we are very careful not to pile undue pressure on them. After all, the tests provide one indication of how well the children have been taught and what they need next. Unlike GCSEs, the children won't put their phonics screening check score on their CVs.

With all of that said, we are delighted that once again Weston has performed well above available national averages in all areas including the Early Years Good Level of Development, the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check, the Year 2 key stage 1 SATs, the Year 4 Multiplication Tables Check and the Year 6 SATs. Full results will be published on the website once this year's national data has been validated in the new school year. Well done to all the staff and children for their hard work.
