# A message from Mr Cutts

Happy new year and welcome back. It has been a wonderful first week back with every class getting staright back to the fun challenges of the curriculum. It has been lovely to see the children smiling and enjoying being back with their teachers and friends.

Pupil attendance has been on the low side this week and the majority of absence is COVID related. COVID will almost certainly cause us all a degree of disruption over the coming weeks. Nationally, there were 4 million positive cases in total on New Years Day and that level of transmission is inevitably going to impact on schools. I ask that you look out for all COVID communication from school and heed any recommendations and requests from the school. Not only does the guidance evolve over time but it can also be confusing, which isn't helpful for anyone. I will continue to interpret it and communicate it to parents in the clearest terms possible but please do ask if you aren't sure or have any questions specific to your own COVID situation.

#### <u>Christmas</u>

It feels like a long time ago but the children enjoyed lots of different activities and experiences. We are very proud of the Reception and Key stage 1 children who took part in nativity and Christingle performance. They were our first school events involving parents since

pre-COVID. I am delighted to report that the performances were a success, thanks to the diligence of the audiences, who abided by the





COVID measures in place. Notwithstanding the rapid transmission of the current COVID variant, we are very optimistic about inviting audiences to future events.

The children also enjoyed other activities including a wonderful festive trail, including sweet treat, courtesy of our hard-working Friends of Weston; a lower school visit to Amerton Farm; an upper school visit to the panto; Christmas crafts and a virtual Weston's Got



Talent, which was won by Albi in Orange class, who impressed us all with his wonderful singing.

These value of these activities to the children's wider development, particularly at a time when they have been starved of experiences of this nature for so long, should not be underestimated.

The children in Orange class enjoyed a visit from Zoolab just before Christmas. It really enhanced their understanding of different species of animals and they got to handle all sorts of creatures including snakes, giant millipedes, hairless rats and giant snails.

# Year 6 Ambassadors Update



The next Friends of Weston meeting is next Thursday


13 January at 7.30pm at The White Lion. All parents are welcome at the meeting, where plans for the months ahead will be made. There is lots to look forward to!

EYFS: Red Rockets and Rainbow Jelly, Sue Heap & Nick Sharratt – the main characters are shown liking different things and ultimately liking each other.





Year 1: Want To Play Trucks?, Ann Stott – two children have different interests but find something they both have in common.

Year 2: Shine, Sarah Asuquo – the main character feels different but is helped to recognise his unique qualities.

Year 3: This is Our House, Michael Rosen and Bob Graham – the main character excludes people for their differences until he is helped to recognise that he, like everyone else, is different and that these differences should be understood and celebrated.

Along Year 4: Along Came a Different, Tom McLaughlin – addresses race and racism by encouraging the reader to question treating people differently on the basis of colour.
