A message from Mr Cutts

It has been fantastic to have a school full of children once more. The impact of the lockdowns and partial school closures on the children's education and wellbeing may not become fully apparent for a long time but we have built in a framework which will help us to identify where children might be in need of additional support for their emotional wellebing, including further staff training to secure our expertise in this area.

Similarly, we are making use of the government's catch up premium funding to identify and fill gaps that might otherwise limit a child's ability to make progress in their learning. Some of this involves staff training so that all children continue to receive the very best quality education. Among other strategies, the funding will also enable us to provide high quality intervention where needed. The research tells us that the highest impact of such an approach comes from it being delivered by experts who know the children. To this end, look out for Mrs Rendall, who is returning to help us deliver some of this intervention, together with existing school staff.

The buzz is back in the building and we are very pleased by the way the overwhelming majority of children have returned. They are keen to learn and show those Secrets of Success, very well-

mannered around the building and warm and caring on the playground. We don't take this for granted and recognise that cracks may appear as time goes on and children find their resilience tested in the ways that happen in schools to produce the very best learning and development. If this happens, we will continue to work with you and to prioritise well-being.

National Day of Reflection

Next Tuesday is a National Day of Reflection to mark a year since the first national lockdown. Everyone's lives changed on 23 March 2020 and since then, some people's lives have been impacted upon considerably.

For the children, their education and social contact have been affected significantly over the last 12 months. There are many aspects of this period for us all to reflect upon, from remembering those lives that have been lost to considering how valuable certain aspects of life are that we might previously have taken for granted, such as spending time with family and being able to attend school.



To mark the day, we will have a virtual assembly and explore some of the themes in an age-appropriate way in the classroom, with one or two related activities. We will also hold a minute's silence.

At 8pm on the day, there is a hope that people will come together on their doorsteps, with candles, torches or mobile phone flashlights and create a collective beacon of hope and support to others. We are all living through such a unique moment in history which has had an impact on everyone. For our children, the opportunity to acknowledge this and to look forwards with hope, is a positive way to support their ability to process it all.

Over the next few weeks, the classroom interior will be fitted and we remain on-track for a grand



opening after Easter. The children loved watching the build and are very excited!
